PACAIR WAREHOUSE

The recently completed Pac Air Project, officially named A.B. WON PAT INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT-GUAM INTEGRATED CARGO FACILITY is a prime example of Guam's readiness for the anticipated increase in economic activities related to the upcoming Military Build-up.

Located alongside the international airport, it was constructed in a 12.4 acres lot and has a floor area of 133,000 SF plus a 35,000 SF mezzanine for office space. It also includes a generator room and a security shack.

Tenants of the building include Continental Airlines, US Customs and Quarantine office, Japan Air Lines and ASIG among others.

YOUR WORK BOOTS MAY BE A HAZARD?

It is a documented fact – slip/fall accidents kill more workers than all other forms of workplace accidents combined. Slip/Fall injuries is the Nation's No.2 Killer (No.1 is automobile accidents) with medical costs exceeding \$30 billion annually.

Over 9 million people are hospitalized each year as a result of a slip or fall injury. This amounts to 1000 injuries per hour, every hour of the day. Over 11 million workdays are lost each year as a result of slip or fall accidents. Check the soles and heals of your boots regularly and replace boots as needed.

GLOBAL HAWK

A concrete high-bay hangar including covered aircraft maintenance space, maintenance support space, supply/tool room/support section, squadron operations, classified storage, maintenance operations center, space for launch recovery element, and secure work areas all in support of the Global HAWK surveillance program vital to US National Security.

OUTSTANDING SAFETY ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

- An accumulation in excess of 452,000 man hours without a lost time incident
- An excess of over 275 individual lifts of pre-cast arch segments with many lifts exceeding 50 tons. There was not a single crane incident.
- Over 100 workers trained and issued Personal Fall Arrest Systems (PFAS). As many as 60 workers at one time utilized PFAS without a single incident causing elongation of a lanyard.
- Erection and dismantling of over 840,000 lbs of mega-shoring, all without incident.
- Zero OSHA related violations.

HEALTH & SAFETY NEWS

PANDEMIC INFLUENZA

Pandemic influenza refer to a worldwide outbreak of influenza among people when a new strain of the virus emerges that has the ability to infect humans and to spread from person to person. Pandemics can vary in severity from something that seems simply like a bad flu season to an especially severe influenza pandemic that could lead to high levels of illness, death, social disruption and economic loss. To protect the health and safety of BCC employees in light of the increasing number of confirmed cases of H1N1 Swine Flu across the globe here are a few TIPS to follow:

- Wash your hands frequently with antibacterial soaps.
- Get at least 8 hours of good sleep every night to keep your immune system in top flu-fighting shape.
- Drink 8 to 10 glasses of water each day to flush toxins from your system and maintain good moisture and mucous production in your sinuses.
- Keep informed.
- Avoid alcohol.
- Be physically active.
- Keep away from sick people.
- Know when to get help. Consult your doctor if you have a cough and fever and follow their instructions, including taking prescribed medication.
- > **Do not** come to work sick! If you are affected, please do not visit the office premise.
- Do not bring sick children to work.

According to the Department of Public Health and Social Services, the novel N1N1 vaccine is expected to be available in mid to late October 2009. Those targeted groups that have been recommended to receive the vaccine when it first becomes available are:

- Pregnant women
- People who live with or care for children younger than 6 months of age,
- Healthcare and emergency medical services personnel,
- Persons between the ages of 6 months and 24 years old
- People 25 through 64 years of age who are at higher risk for novel H1N1 because of chronic health disorders or compromised immune systems.

RAISE THE BAR

Because nobody should have to die earning а living.

OLD APRA HOUSING

On July 1st, BCC's Old Apra Team delivered the final five homes on "Captains Circle" overlooking Apra Harbor at Old Apra housing. Together with our D/B partners, Black Construction contributed to the needs of service members and their families through great design and quality construction which was not a singular task, but a partnership with NAVFAC and Navy Housing. Black Construction delivered what has been described by residents as "the best military housing they've ever lived in" which exemplifies the teamwork and commitment to excellence that went in to construction.

BCC built and delivered the 55 three and four bedroom units at Old Apra, aptly renamed Apra View, in just over 13 months. The new homes of Apra View are approximately 30% larger then the 61 units demolished at the beginning of the project and include a variety of upgrades including state-of-the-art energy efficient appliances, spacious kitchens with islands, increased storage space, roomy master bedroom suites, home office space with technology niches, and covered porches for integrated indoor/outdoor living. In addition various community amenities including sports courts, playgrounds and an open space park were included in the delivery.

With a design commitment to using 100% compact fluorescent energy-efficient lighting, foam insulation to reduce energy loss, ceiling fans and air conditioning heat re-claim units it is anticipated that a resultant 50% energy reduction may be expected. Experience on projects such as Apra View will go far in advancing BCC management's commitment to achieving sustainable designs and LEEDS certification on future projects.

Special recognition goes to the effort of the over 300 craftsmen who contributed to the safe outcome of the project. The project safety team working with site supervisors assured that considerable training took place well above and beyond the normal weekly toolbox meetings. The resultant No Lost Time Accidents is a testament to the projects safety awareness and commitment.

Congratulations and a "Job Well Done" to the BCC OAH Team.



BACK SAFETY

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, more than one million workers suffer back injuries each year, and back injuries account for one of every five workplace injuries. The amount of force placed on your back under certain conditions can be surprising. Anytime you bend or lean over to pick something up without bending your knees, you put tremendous pressure on your lower back. Think of your back as a lever. With the fulcrum in the center of the lever, it only takes ten pounds of pressure to lift a ten pound object.



However, if you shift the fulcrum to one side, it takes much more force to lift the same object. Your waist actually acts like the fulcrum in a lever system, and it is not centered. In fact, it operates on a 10:1 ratio. Lifting a ten pound object actually puts 100 pounds of pressure on your lower back.

When you add in the 105 pounds of the average human upper torso, you see that lifting a ten pound object actually puts 1,150 pounds of pressure on the lower back. Given these figures, it is easy to see how repetitive lifting and bending can quickly cause back problems. Even leaning forward while sitting at a desk or table can eventually lead to back-related problems.

Avoid Lifting and Bending Whenever You Can!

Place objects up off the floor. If you can set something down on a table or other elevated surface instead of on the floor, you won't have to reach down to pick it up again.

Raise/lower shelves. The best zone for lifting is between your shoulders and your waist. Put heavier objects on shelves at waist level and lighter objects on lower or higher shelves.



Use carts and dolly's to move objects instead of carrying them yourself. (It is better on your back to push carts than it is to pull them.)

Use cranes, hoists, lift tables and other lift-assist devices whenever you can. Avoid lifting over your head, and avoid reaching across a table or out the back of a truck.



Avoid working in awkward, uncomfortable positions on tasks that require you to bend over for long periods of time (i.e., gardening). Also avoid sitting or standing for too long without shifting.

SAFETY TIDBITS



We all have the ability to make a positive difference in the lives of those around us and we are given ample opportunities to do so. Some of you have come to me or another supervisor, to report unsafe conditions that you've found (Thanks! - I appreciate your concern and you may have prevented an injury). Others have stopped a co-worker and told them to put on their PPE or tie off a ladder (It shows you care about your fellow man and that is truly priceless). Still others have gone to a supervisor or manager and said 'this piece of equipment is unsafe to operate' or 'we need to address the following issue' (and we know it is not an easy task...but it makes more difference than you will ever know). The real heroes are those of you who continually Step up and Speak out for Safety and I tip my hat to each of you. Never guit! Never sit guiet when you can speak up and make a difference. Never quit caring about your health and safety and that of your co-workers. When we stop stop speaking and people caring, we up get hurt.

You have a chance to make a positive impact, everyday! Stand up and Speak out for Safety.If you don't stepup who will. We may never know who benefited from us doing the right thing. However, we generally knowthose affected when we fail to do the right thing. You have a personal choice to make every day! Do what youmustbutrememberweallhavetolivewiththeconsequences.


